Peer Reviews:

Teachers learning from other teachers

How do teachers learn and grow in their field? As we have looked at lowa Valley's professional learning this year, you have seen that teachers go to conferences and workshops, they collaborate in grade level and vertical teams, they read journal articles and take classes. But one of the most eye-opening learning experiences is the peer review.

Once every three years, a teacher is to be observed and evaluated by their building principal, but in the other years when they are not evaluated, they are to be observed by one of their peers. This process has been looked at a little more carefully this year by our model teachers. When teachers plan for a peer review, it is not to evaluate their colleagues, but to reflect and learn within their own teacher practices. Teachers meet with their peer partner before the observation to plan out what the learning goal will be or what they will be focusing on, then they go into the classroom and observe, and then after the observation, they sit down again and share out what was happening.

This is a reflective practice that helps teachers see other strategies and ways of teaching. When teachers observe other teachers they allow themselves to see what might work for their own teaching. We ask the teachers to reflect on their own teaching practices and take something away to try in their own classrooms.

It is not always easy to step away from their content area or students in their own classrooms, but stepping out into the rest of the building and seeing what's working for others is one more way teachers grow and learn in their educational profession.

Mrs. Ashton Linnell is our highlighted model teacher for the month of April.

As a high school business instructor, elementary and middle school TAG teacher, yearbook sponsor, PBIS Coach/Lead Teacher, and district website coordinator, Mrs. Linnell has a very creative way of dealing with schedules and teaching strategies.
